Arthur Weston Teague, beloved husband, father, grandfather, friend and neighbor, passed away at his home in Red Bluff, CA on 12/20/25 after a period of declining health.

Known to his friends and family as Art, he was born on April 29, 1945 to Edna Teague in Boston, Massachusetts. After completing high school at Marshville High School, he entered the U.S. Coast Guard in 1965. He loved nothing more than to sit in the backyard near his koi pond, collecting eggs from his chickens (who always had a gaggle of chicks!), going on rides to nowhere with Sharon and their dog, or

“puttering” on different projects around the house. He loved a good deal, and he and Sharon loved to hunt for treasures at thrift shops and bargain stores. He was never bored; he could always find a project worth doing. He was a great neighbor, forming many friendships and helping them in many ways.

Art was a jack-of-all trades. He could do nearly anything, and had many skills that he passed to others, including how to live off of the land. While he lived in Shingletown, CA for a while, he actually raised his family in military-style tents camping along the creek, a memory which they cherish. He took satisfaction in fixing and building many things, and in the last months of his life found great joy building birdhouses with his grandson.

Art was welcomed into eternal rest by his mother, Edna. He is survived by his wife, Sharon Teague, children Jack LeClair (Alexis), Melissa Shriver (Jason), Jack Heenan, and Noel Heenan. He leaves a legacy of grandchildren, including Sam, Ava, Amelia, Lillian, and Elliott.
